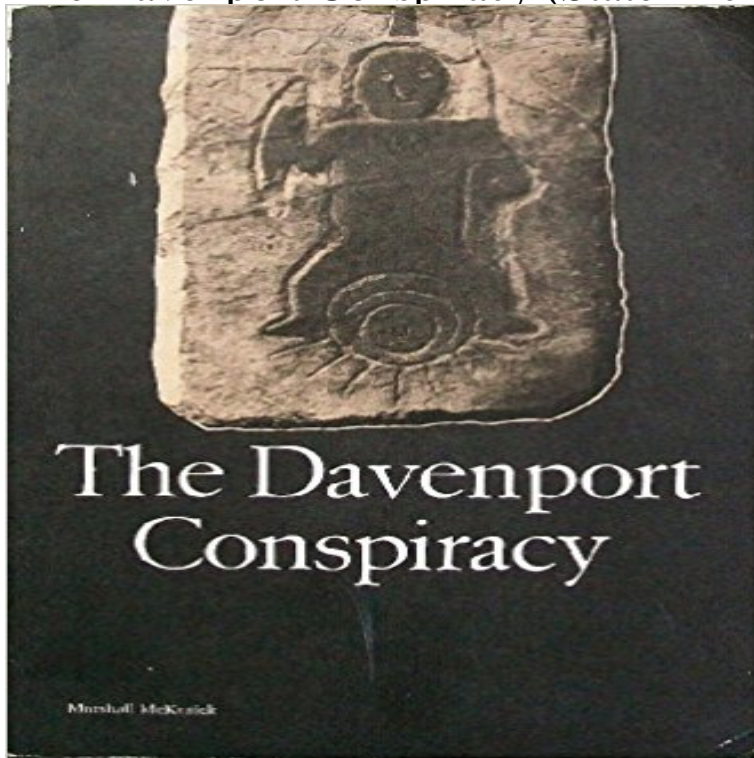


# The Davenport Conspiracy (State Archaeologist of Iowa. Report no. 1)



The discovery of inscribed tablets and elephant pipes by members of the Davenport Academy developed into one of the major controversies in the interpretation of prehistoric America. The private documents bearing upon this incredible example of nineteenth century research have never been previously published or even cited. Full disclosure provides a sordid example of amateur investigations gone awry during the difficult transition to professionalism in American archaeology.
