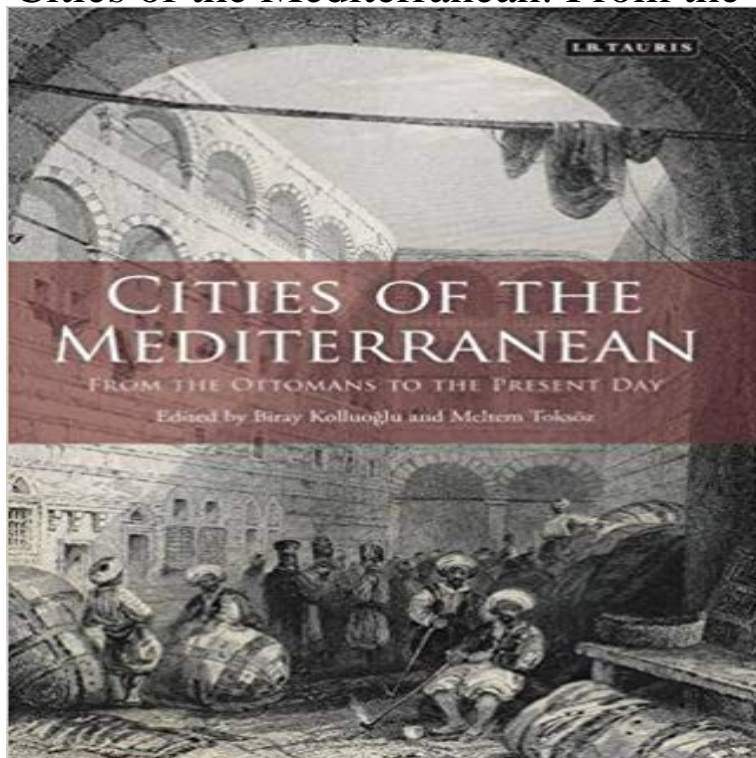


Cities of the Mediterranean: From the Ottomans to the Present Day

Taking a full and comprehensive look at the region as a whole rather than isolating individual cities or distinct cultures, *Cities of the Mediterranean* offers a fresh and original portrait of the entire region, from the 16th century to the present. In this ambitious inter-disciplinary study, the authors examine the relationships between the Eastern Mediterranean port cities and their hinterlands as well as inland and provincial cities from many different perspectives - political, economic, international and ecological - without prioritizing either Ottoman Anatolia, or the Ottoman Balkans, or the Arab provinces in order to think of the Eastern Mediterranean world as a coherent whole. Through its penetrating analysis of the various networks that connected the ports and towns of the Mediterranean and their inhabitants throughout the Ottoman period, *Cities of the Mediterranean* presents the region as a unified and dynamic community and paves the way for a new understanding of the subject.
